SAFE HOUSING

When a woman arrives at LifeWay, she has many needs. Some are immediate: personal hygiene items, clothing, a roof over her head and food to eat. Some are less urgent, but no less important: a resume, job skills, a bank account. Some are impossible to buy from our Amazon Wish List: confidence, a sense of self-worth, coping skills and peace.

It's a mighty and nearly miraculous feat to meet these needs in the course of a year, and it requires tremendous effort on the part of the women who've survived such trauma—often a lifetime of pain, abuse of trust and struggle.

But each year we celebrate Independence Days—none with fireworks, but all with joy, awe and deep gratitude for our community of donors and volunteers who make possible the recovery and hope that we have the privilege to witness.

Recently we saw one survivor earn her driver's license; a rite of passage she never dreamed of experiencing. "I remember how all the staff were cheering for me when I decided to get my permit. Passing on the first try only empowered me to think I could do anything I wanted," she said.

Thanks to the economic empowerment workshops hosted by volunteer Marianne Lannig, this same survivor now has a job and an apartment of her own. "I was able to pursue my passion mostly because I had that peace of mind of having a safe place to live, food on the table and a supportive community who was encouraging and believed in me," she said.

Freedom is a basic need, as vital as a meal. LifeWay's safe housing program meets that need.

Meeting the Growing Demand

In 2022, LifeWay Network provided safe housing to 38 human trafficking survivors. Their transformative journey toward reclaiming their lives was inspiring: 40% pursued education, 35% sought employment and 25% did both. LifeWay remained steadfast in its commitment to stand in solidarity with survivors as they reimagined their lives.



Marianne Lannig provided resume-building and economic empowerment workshops for the residents of LifeWay Network's safe houses. Through these workshops, survivors gained valuable skills in banking and personal finance, job preparedness, resume building and identifying transferable skills for employment.



MESSAGE FROM LIFEWAY NETWORK LEADERSHIP

In 2022, LifeWay Network faced unprecedented opportunities and challenges, but we remained committed to emerging from this uncertain period even stronger and better equipped to serve survivors of human trafficking. While we originally thought the pandemic and other global challenges would have a shorter, less impactful timeline, our organization proved adaptable and resilient in the face of rapid change.

As part of our LifeWay community, I am confident that we can continue making extraordinary progress in the seasons ahead. Despite the difficulties of the past year, we remain focused on growing and flourishing. In 2022, we strengthened our services, developed our AfterCare Program and increased the number of women served by 35 percent.

Challenges persist daily for survivors of human trafficking, but we are proud of the following key points that reflect the unprecedented impact of LifeWay's safe housing and education programs:

- Economic empowerment programming
- Horticultural therapeutic workshops
- Life-skills support for residents on their path to long-term recovery
- Safe exits back into the community, maintaining employment, continuing in community
- An article published in Philanthropy News Digest
- Testimonial delivered at the United Nations

The success of our programs is reflected in our clients' ability to thrive after exiting our program, and in the reduction of PTSD symptoms by 25 percent through support provided by our horticulture workshops.

Looking to the future, we will continue to expand our vision for equal opportunity and equal pay for survivors. By establishing new ways to serve survivors beyond the safe house program and creating a system for their continued recovery and support in the AfterCare Program, we can help survivors secure brighter futures for themselves and their communities.

OUR AFTERCARE PROGRAM

LifeWay's AfterCare Program plays a vital role in providing support to survivors who have secured stable housing. The program offers invaluable assistance and resources to survivors, enabling them to tackle legal concerns, resolve disputes with landlords and access behavioral and treatment resources. Its ultimate goal is to help survivors establish self-sufficiency and security, thereby breaking the cycle of abuse, promoting healing and fostering empowerment.



Whether they have been enslaved for a few months or for many years, trafficking victims need a place that provides security and comfort for both physical and emotional healing. Our safe housing program is the only one in the New York metro area that provides safe housing for both domestic U.S. citizen and foreign national women survivors of every form of human trafficking. LifeWay Network envisions a world in which human trafficking is abolished and every survivor is strong, connected and free.



EDUCATION

ADVOCATING AND RAISING AWARENESS FOR THE ANTI-TRAFFICKING MOVEMENT

Toward our vision of a world in which human trafficking is abolished and every survivor is strong, connected and free, LifeWay provides preventive education in the form of online Lunch and Learn sessions, in-person presentations and workshops, and blogs, social media and graphics.

We also are active in advocacy on behalf of survivors, particularly in the partial decriminalization effort led by New Yorkers for the Equality Movement. We partner with organizations and leaders throughout the New York City metro area; in 2022 our network expanded to include the Queens County District Attorney's office.

SOME SPECIFIC INITIATIVES IN 2022:

LifeWay's executive director and education director were invited to speak at the New York City Council Women's Caucus to discuss LifeWay's work and the importance of anti-human trafficking efforts by the council.

LifeWay Network held its first virtual New York City Council Lunch and Learn.

Queens County District Attorney Melinda Katz invited LifeWay to participate in a panel on labor trafficking for Human Trafficking Awareness Month.



LifeWay joined the New Yorkers for the Equality Model in Albany for a day of activism on behalf of the Sex Trade Survivors Justice and Equality Act.



Philanthropy News Digest published an article by Executive Director Marion Kendall entitled "Community-centered Work Requires Trust from Funders," highlighting the need for flexible funding.



Marion addressed the United Nations in December during their meeting on "The Social and Legal Challenges that Fuel the Trafficking in Women and Children," walking the panel through how LifeWay Network answers "what next" for survivors.

In 2022 we bid farewell to Education Director Tori Curbelo when she left LifeWay for a position at UNICEF. We remain grateful for her tireless activism. We were very fortunate to welcome Josephine Crisostomo to the role; Josephine brings experience from her work for the NYC mayor's office and a heart for serving the LifeWay community.
